# Native Plant Sale

Native plants are easy to grow and maintain because they are well adapted to our soils and climate. Plants native to Michigan will thrive in your yard without synthetic fertilizers or pesticides. Thanks to their extensive root systems, native plants, once established, will require less water than non-native plants.

By landscaping with native plants, you will attract butterflies, bees, birds, pollinators and other beneficial organisms to your yard and provide them with the food and habitat they need to thrive.

Plant families that may be available for fall, consist of: Aster, Bellflower, Buttercup, Carrot, Evening Primrose, Figwort, Grass, Iris, Legume, Lily, Milkwood, Mint, Rose & / or Verbena.

These plants will ONLY be available at the Conservation Expo, Saturday, Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> between 10:00am – 3:00pm; or as supply lasts!

# Successful tree planting with plugs

In the Fall, trees are available in three forms.

Conifers (evergreens) are sold in seedling, transplant or plug sizes.

- A seedling has been in a seedbed for two years. (White Cedar; Douglas Fir; Red & White Pine; Blue, Norway & White Spruce are available)
- A transplant is grown as a seedling, and then transplanted to a larger bed for another year or two to develop thicker and stronger root systems. (Douglas Fir; Blue, Norway & White Spruce are available)
- A plug is germinated from seed in 'plugs' of peat moss and other organic material for a year.
  Since the roots are established in the plug of dirt, they begin to put out new root growth and top
  growth fairly quickly. They experience much less stress during transplanting on your property as
  bare root trees do. They are also much easier and faster to plant! (White Cedar; Jack, Red &
  White Pine; Norway & White Spruce; and Tamarack)

The fall tree program sales are by pre-ordering only; deadline is Sept 1st.

The Qualified Forest Program (QFP) encourages landowners to actively manage their privately owned forests in exchange for a tax exemption from their local school operating millage.

#### Why Enroll Your Property?

- Tax Exemption up to 16 mills on non-homestead properties
- Prevents "uncapping" of a property's taxable value
- Ensure land is sustainably managed
- Public access not required

- Properties 20-640 acres
- Meet productivity and stocking requirements
- Those who have/want a forest management plan

Technical and financial assistance is available through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service for landowners wishing to implement conservation practices on their land. Over the past few years covering the Gaylord Service Center (Otsego, Crawford, and Roscommon counties) I have worked with over 200 landowners to help them better manage the natural resources on their property. Some of the projects we've installed throughout the area include:

- Tree Plantings for Reforestation & Wildlife Habitat
- Wildflower Seedings for Pollinator Habitat
- Cover Crops on Cropland for Soil Health
- Hoops Houses for Crop Season Extension
- Forest Management Plans
- On-Farm Energy Audits
- Fencing & Watering Systems for Prescribed Grazing
- Pasture Seedings
- Invasive Species Removal



If you are interested in any of the above practices, please call my office at (989) 732-6526 x3 and schedule a free site visit. Technical assistance is available to all private landowners, however, to be eligible for financial assistance programs you must have control of the land and be engaged in agricultural or forest product production.

#### MAEAP

#### (Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program)

It is a FREE, CONFIDENTIAL PROGRAM designed to assist all sizes and types of farms in addressing and mitigating any potential environmental risks. The program is intended to be delivered to farmers using a 3-step system:

- ✓ EDUCATION This gives farmers a chance to learn about the program and it's benefits before scheduling a farm visit with their technician.
- ✓ ON-FARM RISK ASSESSMENT This involves having your local technician out to evaluate your farm's management practices. The farm has the opportunity to go through various assessments unique to their operation, which include—Farmstead, Cropping, Livestock, Greenhouse, Nursery/Christmas tree and Forest, Habitat and wetlands Assessment. The technician will give you options on how to improve any 'high risk' practices highlighted in an Action Plan and can provide technical assistance for implementing certain practices.
- ✓ VERIFICATION If the farmer completes the needed improvements highlighted in their Action Plan, the producer can become verified and be able to get a MAEAP sign, along with other incentives for completion.

# Household Hazardous Waste

This past spring, during the Covid-19 lockdown, nearly 700 households in Roscommon County cleaned out their garages and basements and brought items to this semi-annual event. THANK YOU to the 40 volunteers we had for this project and the townships funding. . .it would not be possible without you! The next event is scheduled for Sat., Sept. 12th 9:00am – 1:00pm at the Roscommon County Road Commission; 820 E West Branch Rd/M-55; Prudenville MI.

Some of the items were: ??? # of electronics, 4,518# of oil-based paints, 800# solvents, 1,952# toxic liquids, 766# pesticides, 764# aerosols, 194# acids/bases, 208# cleaning liquids, 78# small propane cylinders, 59# lamp ballasts, 573# florescent light bulbs, 88# medical sharps, 109# pharmaceuticals, 9# mercury-containing items, 8# oxidizers, 173# fire extinguishers & smoke alarms, 5,298# toxic products. Other items locally collected and properly recycled were batteries, used motor oil, 421 tires, cell phones, ink jet cartridges, ammunition & 30 large commercial bags of Styrofoam.

### COMMENTS MADE ON THE SURVEYS COLLECTED FROM PARTICIPANTS (committee & staff responses):

- Map of stations (They were available in the past and stations are also numbered on the flyer.
- Flagger on M-55 and get traffic off highway (traffic was much larger than expected, so we weren't prepared)
- Take #5 plastics (plastics are a township recycling item, not HHW)
- Took too long to get through the line (we are always working on trying to improve the set up and never know how
  many volunteers will be arriving to help on the project; you also only need to get in the line you need)
- Have more events a year & longer hours (this is not possible, due to cost and volunteers)
- Except water-based/latex paint (this can be hardened and put out with regular garbage)
- Do paper shredding (the local libraries sometimes hold these events
- One drop-off station and volunteers sort the items (this is impossible for a few hour event with volunteers)
- More promotion (we use every media we have available to us and hope that others will spread the word)
- Wish county/townships had more recycling (each township has its own contract; contact them for your input)
